Waltham Cross: The Council's top regeneration priority

One of the Council's key priorities is to transform Waltham Cross Town Centre into a place where people want to live, visit and work. As part of a comprehensive wider renaissance programme, there are three related and complementary projects within the heart of the local community.

The proposed improvements aim to restore a sense of pride in the community, addressing identified social, environmental and economic needs. They will underpin the vitality and viability of Waltham Cross Town Centre, encouraging more visitors, generate new employment opportunities, promote private sector investment and contribute to reducing crime and anti-social behaviour.

Restore Civic Pride

Improvements to the public realm within Waltham Cross Town
Centre will transform the heart of the town. Improved pedestrian
and cycle access, plus a more contemporary look and feel, will
improve trade for existing shops and businesses, providing a more
attractive and vibrant environment for new businesses to set up.

Enhance Life Chances

Enhancement to the community hub and skills training centre, which lies in the heart of the town centre, will increase footfall, improve job prospects for local people and reduce poverty.

Health and Wellbeing

The improvements to Waltham Cross playing fields, including the addition of a new skate bowl, refurbishment of the sports pavilion and new outdoor gym equipment, will encourage positive use of leisure time, improve the health and well-being of the local community and reduce anti-social behaviour.

Collectively, these projects will engender civic pride and enhance the attractiveness of Waltham Cross as a place to live and do business. The projects will encourage private investment and increase the town centre's catchment population, improving the range of shops and services offered. Local people will have a better quality of life, enjoying better health and leisure opportunities. Skilled residents will be better equipped to benefit from the higher paying jobs created nearby, such as the planned film studio.



Improving skills and life chances

The additional opportunities to gain skills and qualifications will enhance the life chances of local people.

This will particularly support disadvantaged groups, improving their employment prospects and levels of disposable income. Increased footfall in the town centre will benefit local shops and create a vibrant town centre.




