1. Welcome and introductions

The Youth Council drafted an email together.

7. Medals/Badges/Lanyards

8. UKYP (UK Youth Parliament)

The Youth Council discussed UKYP. Established 25 years ago, the UKYP is made up of more than 300 young people aged between 11 and 18 years, elected as Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs) to represent the views of their peers. It provides opportunities for young people to bring about social change through meaningful representation and campaigning.

Young people vote for their MYPs in elections every two years, which are held in over 70% of constituencies, and often in schools.

Funded through a grant from the Department of Culture, Media and Sport, the UK Youth Parliament brings young people into the policymaking and parliamentary process, with direct access to decision makers.

The Youth Council would like to see a MYP from Broxbourne which would require local schools to support a democratic voting process to establish young candidates. The following youth councillors will speak with school staff to explore interest.
